



Eugenie Ladner Birch, Hunter College

Eugenie Ladner Birch, President of the Society and editor of the *Journal of the American Planning Association*, holds degrees from Bryn Mawr College and Columbia University. She has written extensively on planning history. Her latest piece is "An Urban View: Catherine Bauer Wurster's Five Questions," in the Journal of Planning Literature. In 1985 she edited The Unsheltered Woman, Housing Issues of the Eighties, a study funded by the Ford Foundation. Her present research includes co-authorship of a book on New York City as a world city and participation in the production of the Encyclopedia of New York City, sponsored by the New York Historical Society and Yale University Press. She is the Society's first president, having served since the founding of the Society in 1986.


The 1990 annual meeting will be held with APA in Denver.
